## SELECTED WEB RESOURCES FOR FUNDING: GRANTS AND FOUNDATIONS

In recent years, global efforts to promote health and prevent disease have generated millions of dollars for health care. A major portion of that funding has been allocated for HIV/AIDS prevention and intervention measures. As a result, many HIV/AIDS initiatives are eligible for grant awards through federal, state, local, and private funding sources. Generally, funding of this nature is achieved through solicited or unsolicited grant applications. Grant awards vary and may be used for operational and/or programmatic needs.

The internet serves as a valuable tool for researching many funding opportunities. Many federal agencies announce funding availability through their Web sites. In most cases, these databases provide links to other public and private funding sources; for example, the Society of Research Administrators (SRA) 2000 Grants Web, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, the CDC National Prevention Information Network (CDC NPIN), and the National Library of Medicine (NLM) are several of the many federal agencies that provide grant notification sites and have a network of links to federal government information and services.

Foundations are also excellent funding sources. Currently, it is estimated that there are over 43,000 private foundations in the United States. On an annual basis, these entities award more than \$8 billion towards personal, social, and scientific development. Foundation Directories serve as good resource tools for researching funding interest, eligibility requirements, funding range, and other important information. At present, roughly one percent of private foundations maintain Web sites that disseminate grant-related information. As more foundations use the Internet, that number will increase rapidly. Two major Web sites maintain links to foundations: The Foundation Center and the Council on Foundations.

## SELECTED WEB AND PRINT RESOURCES FOR PROPOSAL WRITING

The first step in achieving grant funding is developing the proposal. A well written proposal is an essential component of the grant-seeking process. Although proposal writing can seem overwhelming for the novice, many resources are available that can assist tremendously with the organization and development of an award-winning proposal, such as those listed below. It is also important to note that proposal writing is just one step in the process. The bulk of time during the initial phase should be spent developing the program or project and researching/identifying appropriate funding sources.

A good proposal is based on sound program planning.<sup>1</sup> A well written proposal will generally contain the following components:

- Executive Summary
- Statement of Need/Social Problem
- Project Description (include goals and objectives)
- Method/Work Plan
- Evaluation Plan
- Future Funding Plan
- Budget/Budget Narrative
- Project Timeline/Activities Chart
- Organization Information
- Conclusion
- Appendices/Addenda

In preparing for the final phase of proposal development (the actual writing), be certain that the program or project is in the current interest of the funder. Keep in mind that a funder's interest may change over time. Also, be sure to adhere to all guidelines and follow the format closely. Proposals are evaluated not only on merit, but the applicant's ability to follow instructions. Critique the proposal objectively, and ask others to read it and provide feedback. Seek technical assistance from the funder if necessary to answer any questions regarding the proposal. Develop a checklist to keep track of all proposal components and requirements, including page limits, number of copies, and the method of submission to meet the application deadline. Often, applications submitted after the deadline will not be considered.

The goals of USAIDS are treating at least two million HIV-infected persons with anti-retroviral therapy, caring for 10 million persons infected with or affected by HIV, including orphans and vulnerable children, and preventing seven million new infections in 14 countries in Africa and the Caribbean.
